THE HENRY R. KRAVIS PRIZE IN LEADERSHIP NOMINATION PERIOD BEGINS

Claremont, Calif., May 25, 2011—Claremont McKenna College (CMC) announced today that it will begin accepting nominations for the seventh annual Henry R. Kravis Prize in Leadership, which celebrates extraordinary leaders in the nonprofit sector. The winner of the 2012 Kravis Prize, which carries a \$250,000 award, will be recognized during a celebratory dinner in Los Angeles in March of next year.

Suggestions of candidates for the Kravis Prize are solicited from the public as well as from a select group of individuals who are invited to serve as nominators based on their knowledge and experience in the nonprofit sector. Suggestions of candidates from the public are currently being accepted and may be submitted through the <u>Kravis Prize website</u>. The nomination period will close on July 1, 2011.

Candidates for the Kravis Prize span a broad range of sectors in the nonprofit field, including economic development, public health, law, human rights, education and capacity building in the nonprofit sector as a whole. Selection criteria for the Kravis Prize include boldness, innovation, creativity, consistency, persistence and effectiveness in bringing a vision to fruition. Nominees also are evaluated based on their accomplishment in realizing the mission of an organization and demonstrating best practices in managing that organization.

"When I was awarded the Kravis Prize in 2009, I knew that it would help financially as well as help raise the visibility and prominence of my organization, the <u>Afghan Institute of Learning</u> (AIL). What I didn't anticipate was how the reputation of the Kravis Prize would bring AIL increased credibility on the international stage. The Prize has opened doors to many new opportunities and inspired my staff to work even harder than they had in the past," said Dr. Sakena Yacoobi, founder of the Afghan Institute of Learning and Kravis Prize winner.

Previous Kravis Prize winners include Roy Prosterman (2006), founder of Landesa (formerly known as the Rural Development Institute); Fazle Abed (2007), founder of BRAC; the Forum for African Women Educationalists (FAWE) (2008); Dr. Sakena Yacoobi (2009), founder of the Afghan Institute of Learning; Pratham (2010), India's largest nonprofit dedicated to improving the reading, writing, and basic arithmetic skills of children ages six through 14; and Vicky Colbert (2011), founder and director of Colombia-based Escuela Nueva Foundation.
